ORIENTATION BEGINS WEDNESDAY

Orientation for new MSUM students runs from Wednesday, Aug. 20 through Saturday, Aug. 23.

MSUM is expecting 1,275 new freshmen and 675 new transfer students on campus this fall. The "Dragon Move-in Crew" will move new students into the residence halls from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., on Wednesday. The crew consists of 50 Student Orientation Counselors and MSUM employees, including President Roland Barden and his vice presidents.

Orientation check-in at the Welcome Tent runs from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Wednesday. Students will meet their Orientation Counselors and other students during SOC Talk from 4 to 5:30 p.m. on The Slab.

On Thursday, the University Welcome Convocation runs from 9:15 to 10:15 a.m. in the Roland Dille Center for the Arts Hansen Theatre. This is the first meeting for the incoming class of 2003 aimed at introducing new students to academic life.

The new MSUM students will be invited to the Making College Count Orientation program. This presentation is designed to help students' transition to campus life. It will be held from 2 to 3 p.m. on Thursday in Hansen Theatre.

Many other events will take place during the week, including dances, departmental meetings, music events, "Campus Capers Live," karaoke, breakout sessions, a barbecue, self-defense and more.

Classes begin Monday, Aug. 25.

TUITION UP 15%; ENROLLMENT UP TOO

Annual tuition at MSUM jumped 15 percent this school year, translating into \$473. Annual tuition here is now \$3,628 (fees add another \$624).

The average tuition hike at all seven Minnesota state university was 15 percent, the increases approved by the Minnesota State Colleges and Universities Board of Trustees.

Next year, tuition will increase another 15 percent at all state universities, which means students will be

asked to pay about \$1,000 more over a two-year period.

Meanwhile, enrollment is up from last year's 7,661 to an expected 7,900 this fall.

FORUM COMMUNICATIONS GIVES \$100,000 TO MASS COMM DEPARTMENT

MSUM'S Mass Communications department will receive \$100,000 over four years from the Forum Communications Foundation. The gift will be applied to the department's resource center and other priority needs.

In making the gift, publisher William Marcil praised the ties between Forum Communications and MSUM, noting the number of alumni who work for the corporation's newspapers, television, radio, and on-line services.

C.T. Hanson, chair of the mass communications department, says the gift will help the department purchase resource and reference materials for students and faculty. It will also assist with the development of an innovative media laboratory to better prepare students for the convergence of print, broadcast, cable, and Internet communications.

A gift from Black Foundation in 1970 provided the seed money for the conversion of a former faculty lounge on the second floor of MacLean Hall to The Forum Resource Center and headquarters for mass communications faculty and students. The Black Foundation became the Forum Communications Foundation in 1993.

MARS MANIA AT SCIENCE CENTER THURSDAY

The excitement has been building for this summer's appearance of Mars, making its closest approach to Earth this month than at any other time in nearly 60,000 years.

Get a first-hand look at Mars on Thursday, Aug. 21 from 9 to 11 p.m. at MSUM's Regional Science Center Buffalo River site, located 15 miles east of Moorhead, off Highway 10, adjacent to Buffalo River State Park.

Away from city lights and in the prairie darkness, participants will get a good view of Mars, which will be about 34.6 million miles away. It won't get this close again until August 2287. Activities include telescope viewing, a make and take activity, and a feature presentation on the "red planet."

The program is free and open to the public. Visitors are encouraged to wear comfortable walking shoes and to bring insect repellent.

In addition, the Science Center hiking trails are open to the public from 6 a.m. to 11 p.m. daily for birding and hiking. Science Center attractions include the nature trails, native plants garden, "Cluster of Prairie Grasses" sculpture, and the interpretive center's bird observatory and special exhibits.

FULBRIGHT SCHOLAR-IN-RESIDENCE

The College of Arts and Humanities has received a Fulbright Grant to support an international Scholar-in-Residence for the 2003-2004 academic year.

Enrique Esquivel Lopez, a resident of Mexico, and an instructor at the Universidad Iberoamericana, brings to the university expertise in communication in the multicultural environment. His research interests include the impact of immigration on the economic and cultural aspects of society, and cultural interpretive approaches linking tradition and modernity in Mexico.

During his 10-month residency at MSUM, Lopez will work with the departments of American Multicultural Studies and Humanities, Languages, and History to offer courses exploring American/Mexican cultural interactions, and the concept of "multiculturalism" in the United States as perceived and experienced by the Latino immigrant community.

As a Fulbright Scholar-in-Residence, Lopez will engage in additional related activities within the greater university and Fargo-Moorhead community. Lopez's residency is funded by the Fulbright Grant Program, and by the College of Arts and Humanities.

* **Helen Sheumaker**, Multicultural American Studies and the Humanities, recently published an essay, "The Commodity of Self: Nineteenth-Century Human Hair Jewelry" in Routledge Press' *Commodifying Everything: Relationships of the Market* (2003). She also received a \$3,000 grant from the American Studies Association Community Partnership Project to help create a web museum with the Clay County Historical Society. The web museum will be created by MSUM students in an American Studies course this spring. This project was also awarded a "Learning that Lasts" grant from the Center for Teaching and Learning, MnSCU.

* **Richard K. Adler**, SLHS, will be presenting a paper on "Voice and Communication Programming for the Transgendered Patient" at the 19th Biennial Symposium of the Harry Benjamin International Gender Dysphoria Association to be held in Ghent, Belgium, Sept. 10-13. Dr. Adler will also present a paper on "Parameters of Resonance in Voice Therapy" at the Annual Conference/Convention of the American Speech Language and Hearing Association in Chicago, November 12-15. Furthermore, Dr. Adler also submitted a grant proposal to the American Speech Language and Hearing Association's Office of Multicultural Affairs and he was notified in July that his proposal will be fully funded for the 2003-2004 academic year. The grant, totaling \$17,000, will be used to offer the introductory course in speech, language, and hearing sciences to students at the Tribal College in Mahanomen on the White Earth Reservation and the grant will pay for the tuition for that course, books, and travel money to the MSUM campus each semester so the students can observe in the SLHS Speech and Hearing Clinic and tour our campus to consider transferring to MSUM and major in SLHS studies.

* **Takanori Mita**, Languages, this summer visited MSUM exchange schools at Kanda University of International Studies and Nagoya Gakuin University in Japan. He also gave a lecture at Tsuda College, which will be added as our third exchange school in Japan next fall. To expand exchange programs in Japan, he visited Tsuda College (the contract has been completed) and Kanto Gakuin University (the

contract will be completed in fall 2003). He also attended the Asian Conference at Saint Paul University, Tokyo.

* **Michael Paul Gallo**, Elementary and Early Childhood Education, during the week of August 28-31 presented six storytelling sessions as part of the Fargo Public Library's summer reading program. He told folk tales and stories from around the world including Germany, India, Kenya, Thailand, and the United States.

* **Les Bakke**, Computer Services, served on a selection committee for a computer director and three staff members to work for the city of Moorhead. On July 21, they interviewed 11 applicants for the four open positions. The committee made its recommendations and according to a Fargo Forum article, the four individuals accepted the positions. The committee included three city of Moorhead employees and three IT directors from the community. The computer staff provides service to all areas of the city in several locations. Also in July, Bakke presented new software applications that the Department of Veterans Affairs is developing. The group was the GI Bill officials from the colleges and universities of North Dakota and western Minnesota. The software development is a result of the national advisory committee recommendations. Bakke served on that committee for the past two and half years. The new software will coordinate data from colleges and university with data at the state and federal level. The software will also provide information on degree programs to veterans. For instance, if a veteran enters search criteria for a Criminal Justice program in Minnesota, our program will appear. The expected completion date is summer, 2004.

* **Shelton Gunaratne**, Mass Communications, presented a paper titled "Habermas, public sphere, and communicative-action theory: Eurocentrism or universalism?" at the Australian and New Zealand Communication Association Conference in Brisbane, Australia, July 9-11.
