C. OUTLINE OF MAJOR CONTENT AREAS

- 1. Review popular interpretations of the past based on religious beliefs, political ideas, ethnic sensibilities and other social factors, including versions of antiquity inspired by the Bible, the American Moundbuilder epic, the Ahnenerbe movement in Nazi Germany, Zimbabwe, the Kensington Stone, the Ebla controversy, and the America B.C. movement.
- 2. Compare the methods by which professional scholars (in history and archaeology) construct their versions of the past and the "mythistorical" components of every historical effort.
- 3. Deal with archaeological materials and interpretations, along with historical sources.
- 4. Examine the way the past is "constructed" by interest groups, with sometimes fabulous and sometimes unfortunate results.

- 1. Be able to critically examine popular reconstructions of the past in a social science perspective
- 2. Recognize the ethical issues involved in the interpretation of people's past
- 3. Be able to recognize the motivations in a variety of reconstructions of the past
